

## **Defining Time Poverty**


- There are only 24 hours in a day
- Competing claims on individuals' time require tradeoffs
  - paid work, subsistence production, domestic work, care work etc.... and physical/physiological replenishment.
- Households at the margin




## Poor infrastructure contributes to women's time poverty

- Energy




#### Time Spent Fetching Water by Women and Men in Benin (1998), South Africa (2000), Madagascar (2001), and Ghana (1998-99)






### Time Spent Collecting Firewood by Women and Men in Benin (1998), South Africa (2000), Madagascar (2001), and Ghana (1998-99)




